"Pilgrims"

As I write, it is a week before Thanksgiving and I am thinking about pilgrims. Obviously at this time of year we think about the Pilgrims of Plymouth Colony in the early seventeenth century, but pilgrims are actually much older than that. A pilgrim is one who embarks on a journey, usually for spiritual or religious purposes. The word "pilgrim" comes from the Latin "peregrinus" and means "traveler" or "one from abroad." The tradition of traveling to a holy place or to take a journey for spiritual enrichment is an old one and was known in Ancient Egypt, Persia, and Greece as well as India and China. In Jewish tradition there were three annual festivals at which Jews were encouraged to make a pilgrimage to Jerusalem: Passover, Shauvot (the Feast of Weeks, or Pentecost), and Sukkot (the Feast of Booths). In modern day Islam, of course, every able Muslim is obligated to make a pilgrimage to Mecca sometime in their life.

Christianity also has a long history of pilgrims. Many people from the time of Constantine in the fourth century, up to modern times, have made a pilgrimage to the Holy Land in order to see the things that Jesus saw and walk where Jesus walked. Most of you know by now that Erin and I will be spending a couple of weeks in Israel and Palestine in January with a group from Louisville Seminary and we will be able to visit Nazareth, Bethlehem, Jericho and Jerusalem. We will visit mosques, pray at the Western Wall, and worship at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre (the traditional site of Jesus' burial and resurrection). We will have an opportunity to write a blog as we travel, so those of you who want to follow along can read our daily entries about our pilgrimage (ain't technology great?).

But the most popular pilgrimage since the Early Middle Ages for Christians in Western Europe has not been Jerusalem or Rome, but the town in northern Spain, Santiago de Compostela. Why would that be? One of the reasons must be ease of travel, that it was easier to go the relatively few miles to northern Spain than to travel all the way to Jerusalem. But what did this town have to offer? The name "Santiago" is from the Latin "Sanctu Iacobu"—Saint James. This town is the legendary home of the remains of St. James the apostle, brother of Saint John. Tradition says that James traveled to Spain and proclaimed the good news in the years after Jesus' resurrection. After receiving a vision from the Virgin Mary, he traveled back to Jerusalem where he was beheaded in 44 A.D. His bones were then gathered by his followers and taken back to Spain where they eventually were buried in Compostela. St. James is now the patron saint of Spain. So many people have traveled here through the centuries that there is a "Way of St. James," a foot path for pilgrims stretching 500 miles from the mountains of France ending at the Cathedral of Santiago. After we are in Israel, Erin and I will take an extra few days and drive (no 500 mile hike for me yet) from Madrid to Santiago.

We all are pilgrims on a journey. Erin and I are privileged to walk in the footsteps of so many pilgrims before us to travel to the Holy Land and to Santiago. I know it will be a spiritual journey as well as a physical one. Thanks to all of you who have made this pilgrimage possible. I look forward to sharing it all with you as we travel and when we get back.





Enjoy your shopping trip, wrap the gifts and put the name of the recipient on the package. We will also be gifting food items for their Christmas dinner.


They are vegetarians, so no meat!

Whence Comes This Rush of Wings? (Listen for the Angels Singing)

For all of you who love the music of Christmas, and who doesn't, here are my personal recommendations.

First and foremost, do not miss the annual Festival of Lessons and Carols from King's College Chapel, in Cambridge, England. This service is so beautiful and so famous that people stand in line day and night for several days just to get into the chapel to hear it. The fact that it is broadcast live all over the world on Christmas Eve further underscores its importance.

The King's College Choir of men and boys is widely recognized as one of the very finest choirs in the world. The college staff, townsfolk of Cambridge, and the chapel clergy and choristers take part in reading the lessons from the Bible (the King James version, of course) and the choir sings the carols. Naturally, the large congregation sings several additional carols. All of this takes place in the 15th century chapel on the grounds of King's College. It is long and narrow and its vaulted ceiling seems almost to get lost in the heights, all of which make for thrilling acoustics. The service begins at 3 p.m. in Cambridge, which means it comes on here live at 10 a.m. on Christmas Eve. Last year WMUK-FM, Western Michigan University's radio station in Kalamazoo, carried the program locally (102.1 FM); but they have been sporadic in offering it. You can always find it on Michigan State University's station, WKAR-FM at 90.5 FM. Same time; 10 a.m.


Offering #2:

All of this is deep spiritual food, my friends. Come taste and see; the banquet will be ready.
