

He played in the Major Leagues for the St. Louis Cardinals, Boston Braves, Chicago Cubs, and St. Louis Browns; sometimes when I have a good dream I find myself playing ball for the Cubs. 

Deng's brother, Abraham, sent these pictures to Mary Lou Cazers when he returned to Boston from Kenya last month.


Mary Lou also included part of an article written on March 18, describing some of the very disturbing things happening where our brother Deng had hoped to work.

"South Sudan's relationship with the United Nations has plummeted to an unprecedented low as authorities have beaten U.N. personnel and relief workers, forcibly searched their vehicles, and organized public demonstrations demonizing the world body as an enemy of the fledgling African nation, according to a confidential internal report obtained by Foreign Policy.

South Sudanese forces have also routinely stopped U.N. convoys transporting food, medicines, and other humanitarian goods, and in many cases, beat the truck drivers, according to the report. In one case, explosive experts from the U.N. Mine Action Service (UNMAS), were prevented by South Sudanese and Ugandan government forces from clearing bombs from an area south of Bor.

Relations between the U.N. and the South Sudanese government have been tense for well over a year, but they have markedly deteriorated since the world's youngest independent country erupted into civil war in December 2013."

# 2014 Birthday Offering



### Presbyterian Women

In 1922, to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary (PCUS), it was decided that an offering should be made for a definite cause. That year, Hallie Paxson Winsborough, superintendent of women's work, visited Miss Dowd's School for Girls in Kochi, Japan. She challenged members of the Woman's Auxiliary to give one penny for each year of their lives (or a dollar if a woman preferred not to reveal her age) as a birthday gift to the school. The tradition continued when the Woman's Auxiliary became Presbyterian Women (PCUSA) in 1988. The offerings have enabled a long succession of new and often innovative mission projects throughout the world.

While the projects and donation amounts have changed, Presbyterian Women's commitment to improving the lives of others has not. We continue to need broad, consistent support from Presbyterian women, men and others in the area in order to continue funding mission projects like the one selected for 2014. Our goal for 2014 is \$500,000.

This year we will answer the call to show Jesus' love to the world, offering our prayers and financial support to Blue Corn Mothers Alliance in Albuquerque, New Mexico. This organization offers a range of services for Native American women who have experienced domestic violence. Through a Birthday Offering grant, Blue Corn Mothers' advocacy center will operate five days a week (rather than just one), providing crisis intervention; health, counseling and education services; and referrals for legal and shelter services.


Research shows that Native American women are more likely to experience intimate partner violence than non-Native women. More than one in three Native women will be raped in her life, and 39% of Native women experience domestic violence in some form. At least 70% of the violent incidents and a full 86% of reported rapes are perpetrated by non-Native people, suggesting they are taking advantage of the reservation's lack of jurisdiction over non-native people.\*

Thank you for your faithfulness in giving and your ongoing prayers for women struggling with domestic violence! As you have been blessed, so may you bless others.

# Coming In May ...







The Richland Farmers' Market, a mission of the First Presbyterian Church, in its 7th year of operation, and is located on the grounds of the Gull Lake Middle School (former High School; 9550 East M-89, Richland, MI 49083), The market will be open Wednesday afternoons (3:00-6:00 p.m.), May 21st to October 15th. Vendors set up in a small parking lot behind the Gull Lake Middle School, which can be reached by turning south into the school complex at the stoplight. There is access to restroom facilities on-site in the middle school building, but no running water or electricity.

The goals of the market are threefold: 1) to be a profitable outlet for local farmers and craft vendors, 2) to create a gathering spot and opportunity for social interactions for Richland area residents, and 3) to provide a predictable, ample selection and variety of high quality fresh, locally-grown produce and crafts for customers.

We are a proud partner of the Michigan Farmers Market Association (MIFMA) and the Food Assistance Partnership. We will again be accepting Bridge Cards at the market; come on out and use your cards for fresh, local, healthy food.
