

"Into the Fray"

The following resolution was approved at the Stated Meeting the Presbytery of Lake Michigan, Presbyterian Church, USA on March 11, 2017.

"Whereas, the President of the United States, in two separate executive orders has suspended refugee persons from Syria, Iran, Libya, Somalia, and Yemen, with the nation of Iraq having been removed in the second executive order, from entering the United States pending further vetting and examination. It should also be noted the listed countries predominately have a Muslim majority. The president and his administration has indicated that both executive orders, one being opposed in court and the other more recently signed to be clearer of the Trump administration's intentions, are enacted to protect the national security of the United States. These executive orders further harm those who are the victims of genocide, terrorism, religious and gender-based persecution, and civil war in their own country and attempting to flee such trauma inflicted by these horrific acts while furthering unnecessary delay of entry into the United States.

Whereas, this ban contradicts the very foundations of our biblical faith to welcome the stranger and give safe haven to the refugee, and

Whereas, Jesus himself, with his family, began his life, as a refugee, which is recorded in scripture (Matthew 2:13-18).

Therefore be it resolved, in concurrence with a similar resolution shared by the Presbytery of the Redwoods and statements made by the Reverend Doctor J. Herbert Nelson II (Stated Clerk of the Presbyterian Church (USA)) in opposition to these executive orders, the Presbytery of Lake Michigan recognizes the monumental task of maintaining the national security of the United States, but opposes any executive order, past or present, or any other government policy (law or

regulation) to be used for the purpose of discrimination of refugees by nationality, color, or religion. The Presbytery of Lake Michigan deems this as contrary to biblical teaching of the Christian faith and to the traditions and values of the United States.

Further be it resolved, that this resolution would urge President Donald J. Trump to rescind any executive order or any potential legislative proposal that would have serious negative consequences for refugees entering the United States and create a sound-based policy for all refugees, not driven by fear or anger, but of clear rationale and compassion for refugees attempting to find a better and safer life in the United States."

This is the resolution that was adopted by our presbytery a few weeks ago. This is the kind of issues we have been discussing on Sunday mornings in Adult Sunday School. What should our response be? How is God calling us to be faithful in this time and in the places where we live? Can our congregation do anything? Do we jump into the fray? Or is writing letters what we are comfortable doing?

Come join us for a lively discussion in the Gull Prairie Room at 11:15 each Sunday. All opinions are welcome, all persons are respected. We maintain our commitment that the church is a "safe" space. To us that means that every person is welcome, each one's gifts are valued, and we try to see the face of Christ in everyone we meet. What does this mean for the issues of our day? Come and let's talk!



If you're able to be here, feel free to bring any cleaning supplies that might help. If you have a Swiffer, that would be wonderful,








Part of the Presbytery of Lake Michigan history, and ours, is Camp Greenwood! But that doesn't mean it's






March 22, 2017





Credo Chapter 2: Who is God? First Presbyterian Church of Richland Murray M. Cooper February 10, 2017

Introduction

God is the ground and foundation of reality. God is the prime cause from which all other causality descends. The physical creation, a divine act of God, is the result of that prime cause. God brought the physical creation into being by his will and not by reshaping any preexisting matter, creation *ex nihilo*. The nature and structure of the physical creation is fully reflective of God's will. This means that laws which govern the physical creation reflect God's intent. As such, all things which occur naturally in the physical creation are a direct result of God's creational acts.

When we attempt to discern who this creative God is, we come face to face with an unknowable mystery. In God, we are confronted with a being who appears to dwell beyond the boundaries of the physical creation as we know it, who is not subject to the natural laws that govern the physical creation. This being is both eternal, existence without beginning or end and infinite, existence without boundary. What we know about God comes from his self-revelation to humanity and what we might logically infer from his self-revelation.

God is Triune

God's self-revelation, particularly in the New Testament, but arguably also in the Old Testament, is that of a triune being, three persons of one substance, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The three persons are distinctive but representative of a perfect relationship in that while the persons maintain their distinctive nature, they perfectly and completely know each other's thoughts, are always in agreement, and act in a unified manner. However, that God is triune is

not a provable statement. It is a statement of faith (belief). The beliefs in such a triune being arise out of the human experience of God as existing, acting, and revealing God's self in three natures.

However, the nature of such a triune being, three persons in one substance, is beyond the ability of human cognitive understanding. Because of the human inability to cognitively comprehend a triune being, it is not possible to express in any adequate way the nature of such a being. Perhaps the most that can be said is that the three members are mutually distinctive: (1) the Father is not the Son nor the Spirit; (2) The Son is not the Father nor the Spirit; (3) The Spirit is not the Father nor the Son. However, all three are God.

Relationships and Works of Members of the Trinity

The three members of the trinity are distinguished among themselves according to their special works. While their works are many and varied, they are distinguished majorly in the Nicene Creed as: (1) Father – creator; (2) Son – savior; (3) Holy Spirit – giver of life. The Father, as creator, is father to the creation in a sense analogous to the actions of earthly parents. In this sense, the Father gives birth to the creation. As a parent, he loves his creation. He watches over, cares for, has concern for, and guides his creation. His will is for the full flourishing of all of creation.

The Son, as savior, redeems the creation from the fall into sin. Through the incarnation as the divine man, Jesus Christ is the revelation of the Triune God so that humanity may know God, his will and his ways. Both human and divine, Jesus is the intermediary between the Father and humanity, bringing the Word of the Father to humanity and lifting humanity up to communion with the Father.

The Holy Spirit, as giver of life, is the means that the Triune God has chosen to interact with the creation. It is through his power that the creation came into being. Through him,

God speaks to humanity, including through the words of the prophets. Through him, the Son was incarnate of Mary, became man, and dwelled among us. Through his power, Jesus who was dead, was raised to new life. Through him, Christ's Church came into being, is sustained, and guided in God's ways. Through him, humanity is opened to faith in God, taught, and guided. Through him, humanity is engrafted into the body of Christ to participate in the communion of the Trinity.

Triune worship is shaped by the relationship of the members of the Trinity. Jesus Christ, our savior and intermediary, is the center of our worship. Through him, by the power of the Holy Spirit, we are presented to the Father as whole, righteous, and sanctified individuals. Through him, by the power of the Holy Spirit, our prayers and worship are lifted up to the Father. Through him, by the power of the Holy Spirit, the Father's love provides all that is necessary for life.

Attributes of the Triune God

The fundamental nature of God is a being of relationship and covenant. God, as three persons in one substance, is defined by the relationships among the three persons. Furthermore, God is covenantal in that the three persons share duties and obligations, one to the others, in a perfect harmony of cooperation and obedience, one to the other. The distinction of the three persons, in duties and obligations, does not imply a hierarchy among them, rather all are equal in all ways. These fundamental attributes define all other attributes that are imputed to God.

The attributes of God, strongly attested in scripture, are love, righteousness, justice, and mercy. Love, which we experience only imperfectly, is expressed perfectly in God in the relationship of mutuality within the triunity. God's love is expressed toward the creation in his gracious (uncompelled) acts which sustain and work for the flourishing of the creation. God's

righteousness is expressed in his work to establish right relationships, those typified by mutuality. God's justice is expressed in his work to ensure that all receive what is due to them and that all meet their obligations to others. Finally, God's mercy is expressed in his patience and willingness to defer punishment for those who deserve it. Unlike human acts, God's acts of love, righteousness, justice and mercy are not subject to judgment. God's actions cannot be judged as good or bad, since there is no power or norm outside of God to which they may be compared.

There are also "negative" attributes of God. They are negative in the sense that they are derived as attributes which are different from humanity, since God's being is different from humanity. God is infinite in the sense that nothing exists outside of him so that there is no way to measure his extent. God is eternal in the sense that his existence has neither a beginning nor an end, unlike mortal humanity which is born and dies.

Since time is part of the creation, God is not bound by it. From God's view, all time exists as a static dimension such as width, depth, and height. Since God is infinite, there is no place where God is not. God is omnipresent. Since God is infinite in being, he must also be infinite in power. God is capable of doing whatever God chooses. God is omnipotent. Since God is omnipresent, he is aware of all things in both space and time. God is omniscient.

Another attribute of God is suffering. Unlike corporal created beings, God's existence is non-corporal therefore he is not capable of experiencing physical pain. However, God can experience what might be imperfectly called mental pain. Since God has perfect love, his desire for the creation is that it exist in perfect relationship with God, which implies that the creation would also exist in perfect relationship within itself. As this perfect relation does not exist, God's desire is frustrated. In this sense, God feels the pain of rejection and separation from the object of his love.


Creation and the Triune God

The prime causality of God should not be construed to imply God's culpability for any "bad" occurrences. This is true for two reasons. First, distinctions of good and bad are not applicable to God, since as mentioned above there is no external authority or norm by which God's actions can be judged. Second, with particular reference to human action, one of God's creative acts was to grant free will to humanity. Thus, humanity may freely choose to act in concert with God's will or against it. Acting against God's will result in "bad" occurrences. The culpability for these "bad" occurrences lies with humanity, not God.

Humanity has recognized from earliest time that the creation is predictable. That is the creation acts in a rational way according to fixed laws. Any perception of unpredictability is mistaken and results from humanities lack of understanding or misunderstanding of God's fixed laws. As God created humanity with an inquiring mind capable of understanding the creation, humanity has grown in understanding of the way the creation functions. Modern scientific inquiry is a result of this. As such, the discoveries of modern science, so long as they are properly distinguished and understood, should be reflective of God's will. Thus, if properly understood, knowledge does not conflict with God's actions.

The idea that God made the creation to act according to fixed laws should not be interpreted as God having made the creation and left it to run autonomously (i.e. deism). God is in total control of the creation which continues to exist only by his will. The omnipotent, omnipresent, and omnipotent God is capable of breaking into the creation, in divine acts, to achieve his desired ends.

God's will while being active is also permissive. Since God thought it important to grant humanity free will, he is permissive of that will allowing humanity to decide whether or not to act in concert with God. However, while God is patient with human free will, he will not ultimately allow that free will to thwart his will. God acts providentially, turning the results of "bad" human choices to good in small, generally unseen ways, that achieve his desired ends. When necessary, God may also act in big ways, openly acting in ways that display the divine power to bring the creation into compliance with his will.


