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"Candles"

When Erin and I were in Israel, one of the "spiritual experiences" we had was lighting candles. In many of the churches and holy sites that we visited, there were altars set up for prayer, and candles that could be lit as an aid to prayer. This is an ancient tradition in many faiths. It is common in Catholic churches to light a candle for someone for whom you are praying. In our tradition we often have candles lit in the sanctuary as a sign of the fire of the Holy Spirit and as a sign of Christ, "the light of the world."

In the Church of the Annunciation in Nazareth I took a moment to light a candle and knelt for a moment in prayer for those who were on my heart. Erin was touched by the beauty and solitude of a small altar of Mother and Child in the Armenian section of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem. She took a moment to light a candle there for her sister who was ill with cancer. This tradition got me thinking; why do we light candles like this? Does God hear our prayers better if we light a candle? That doesn't seem right. Maybe we are lighting candles for ourselves. If we light a candle, perhaps we are symbolically trying to reflect the light of Christ into our lives and into the world. In the Gospel of John, Jesus says that he is the light of the world. But in Matthew, Jesus teaches his disciples that they are the light of the world. This only makes sense to me if we, as his disciples are taking his light into our lives and reflecting that light to the world around us.

In the last few months I have often visited the website gratefulness.org. This is a website dedicated to the idea that gratefulness for life and God's gifts to us can be a "practice that fosters personal transformation, cross-cultural understanding, interfaith dialogue, intergenerational respect, nonviolent conflict resolution, and ecological sustainability." On their website they have a place to light candles. I encourage you to go on and try it. It is a calming, prayerful practice, even when you do it in the virtual world.

As I have watched the news the last few weeks about the unrest, hatred and death in the Holy Land, I have had a harder time being grateful. I think back on our trip in January and those people that we met; Jews, Muslims, and Christians, and I pray for them. But I think this is exactly the time I need to be lighting more candles and being grateful to God for all of his creation and to continue to pray for non-violent conflict resolution. I hope you will light a candle and say a prayer too. The peace that we all desire will not just be another cease-fire, but a return to wholeness, or as they say in Hebrew, shalom, or in Arabic, salaam.

The hand-holding which was the gluing.


The world of adults seemed to tire you








August 2014 Missionary Report

Dear All, I want to give thanks to Partners in Compassionate Care (PCC) board members and Memorial Christian Hospital (MCH) administration for the trust put in me to serve for a second time at MCH. The conflict in South Sudan started last December. It was after that when they hired me as logistics coordinator. I visited MCH compound in Werkok on July 16th to inspect the facility. Peter Aguto, Mission Garden of Christ (MGC) agriculture Supervisor was with me. It had rained heavily. Our vehicle would not make it. We used a motorbike instead. Peter maneuvered very well in the muddy, flooded areas. We took 9 mango plants with us and planted them on the MCH compound.

Deng Jok, the MCH police guard who guards the compound and David, our compound dog, greeted us at the gate. I was happy and felt a sense of being at home when I stepped my foot on the compound. On the other hand, I felt miserable when I saw many empty houses in Werkok. There are currently only 27 women and 17 men in Werkok. The recent conflict inflicted fear and has played a huge role in the desertion of homes in Werkok. The government is trying to get residents to come back. Most are not listening to the government's call until there is a guarantee of peace and security in the region. I asked some of the people how they feel about staying in Werkok. "We will never fear of anything because with know the Angels of God are with us," said one of the elders. They have even planted their farms and very soon they will harvest their crops if the security situation stays stable.

My purpose of going to Werkok was to inspect the facility. Solar panels and batteries are in good condition. I'm not sure of charging of the batteries. I turned on the solar when I entered the room and the reading was 0.26. It could be low due to the cloudy day or the lack of power from generator since it is not running as usual. It does not recharge the battery when the power is on. The water pump is in good condition. Peter Kuchkon uses the battery from the tractor to fill the tank. The gates are in good shape. I could not check the entire fence due to elongated grass and water. I was also walking barefoot and it was unsafe as there may be snakes and hazardous residues. Deng Jok told me he fixed the open places under the fence. When the rebels came to the compound, people passed underneath the fence to get to safety. The dining hall at MCH is damaged. It leaks during the rain. I was shocked when I entered the hospital wards. The wards are full of bat waste. The bats are hiding under patient's beds and on the ceiling in the hospital. The caterpillar will not start. The battery seems okay. The four storage containers remain locked. I opened the tools container when I was looking for digging tools to plant the mangos. The doors and windows need repair. One of our pit latrines is still functioning but it needs repairs. The new modern latrine building is in good shape. The septic tank slab is decent. The internet and phone do not work. I suspect the problem is in the wires. There is one drum of fuel left. Last but not least, the whole compound is occupied with grass. This is my report on my visit to Werkok. Thank you, Deng Alier


