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"How's it going?"

It's surprising how often I get this question these days. And it is usually asked with a look of concern—not for me. I think. Erin and I are doing fine. But there seems to be concern for the church. That's understandable, it is tough times for many churches. As we are coming out of these years of the pandemic, many churches are struggling to deal with the aftermath. Some churches have lost members due to the passing of people from Covid (remember we have lost over a million people in our country) or folks who decided that they really didn't need church and so have stopped coming. Some churches are struggling financially because people who stopped coming also stopped giving and many churches are finding it hard to make ends meet. Other churches are struggling with leadership because there are many pastors who found their jobs had substantially changed during the pandemic, that they had shifted from being one who preached and taught the gospel to one who coordinated online offerings and virtual content. Pastors who felt that they "didn't sign up for this" are retiring if they are able or even resigning at a rate much faster than during the pre-pandemic years. And so, some churches are struggling.

So, when someone asks, "How's it going," they most often mean, "How are we doing?" And I'm a little surprised by the question, because from my vantage point, we're doing very well. I consider us to be very blessed. Let's look at our "condition."

Financially, we're in a pretty healthy place. We should finish 2022 with more receipts in the General Fund than expenditures, and that certainly didn't always happen in the years before the pandemic, so I'm constantly grateful for the generosity of this congregation. And remember in the midst of all of this, over the last four years we have undertaken two capital campaigns, one to buy and fix up the Deacon Brown House, and a second to replace the steeple, fix the sanctuary floor and recarpet the Gull Prairie Room—all longstanding needs. And we have been able to raise enough money that both those projects were completed, and we were

able to pay cash and not take out any loans. So financially we're doing well.

Attendance is a hard one to judge. We have been having 70 or so in person worshiping with us during the Sundays in Advent and we were thrilled to have 15 kids involved in the Christmas program on December 18th. We are continuing to broadcast our worship service each Sunday on Facebook Live—thanks to our production crew of Jeremiah and Jack and Zoe! How many does this bring in? That's difficult to say. During "live" worship we may have 25 or 30 watching (that's devices: computers, phones, ipads, adding up to about 40-45 people, we think) but then we send out via email a link to the service and post a recording on our Facebook page. For the last two Sundays in December, we had 249 "views" on December 18 and 267 on December 25 th . And we had 305 views for our virtual Christmas Eve Meditation. So far. The count for these services continues to go up. Therefor, I'm encouraged that our worship is reaching people in one way or another.

Leadership in our church is one of the most exciting parts of our church this year. We have added staff member to our payroll: Paul Gobble as communications director, Rachel Little in the office, Brooke Held directing the children's ministries, and Amber Beals with small groups. Added to them are our volunteer staff: Jeremiah Smith with video production assisted by Jack Sizer and Zoe Gobble, Erin O'Sullivan as pastoral assistant, Karen Urban assisting in the office; and with our ongoing staff members of Connie Slater, our sexton, Gretchen Ferris our treasurer, Chris Gobble the financial secretary, Larry Myland our director of music and Owen Rushford choir director, along with the elders, deacons and all the other volunteers, this is a team that is positive, excited and hard-working. In all my time in ministry this is one of the most exciting and fulfilling time to be pastor of this church. How's it going? It's going great!

And we are most grateful for all of you, who make this church a joyful place, making a difference in our community, serving God in so many ways. Thank you!


Shared Blessings: A Matthew 25 Service Group

Wait, What? Questions & Answers

Do you have questions about something you heard in church? Have you always wondered why we do or say the things we do? Wondered what something means? This regular column is the place to bring up those questions and try to find an answer.

"Still Christmas?

It's January now, but I understand that in the church's way of looking at it, it's still Christmas! How long does Christmas last? Is that why we leave the tree up in the sanctuary so long?

You're right, this can be confusing. Christmas is a day—December 25 th. But it is also a season, the 12 days between December 25 and January 6, when we celebrate Epiphany. Traditionally, December 25 th is the day that Jesus was born and January 6 th is the day that the wise arrived in Bethlehem to give their gifts to Jesus, Mary and Joseph. But it wasn't always seen this way. Some churches, predominantly Orthodox, in places where they still use the Julian calendar (England and Scotland adopted the more common Gregorian calendar in 1752—there is usually a difference of about 11 days), they celebrate Christmas on January 7 th. This happens in Russia, Ukraine, Egypt, Ethiopia, Georgia, Macedonia, Serbia, and some others.

And this wasn't always the case. In the very early church, Christians did not celebrate the birth of Jesus at all. In the first centuries of the Christian faith, people celebrated Epiphany—the revelation of Christ to the world symbolically through the arrival of the foreign magi, Easter—the resurrection of Jesus, and Pentecost—the coming of the Holy Spirit and the "birthday" of the church. The first Christ Mass was celebrated on December 25 th in the year 336. The first Roman Emperor to embrace the Christian faith was Constantine and he is the first to name this a holiday. As to why December 25 th was chosen is a question of much debate. The Annunciation—the angel Gabriel's announcement to Mary that she had been chosen as the mother of Jesus—was traditionally celebrated at the spring equinox, then thought to be around March 25 th . So, add nine months and we get December 25 th.

For the first few centuries of the Christian faith, there was great resistance to celebrating the birth of Jesus, or of any saint at all. Early Christians believed that birthdays should be mourned, not celebrated, because this is the day that people are born into their lives of suffering. Instead, Christians celebrated the day that a saint was martyred, because that was the day of their true birth into the heavenly, spiritual realm. So people celebrated Easter instead.*

But the date of December 25 th stuck and since there are 12 days between Christmas Day and the celebration of Epiphany on January 6 th, thus came to be the "12 Days of Christmas," and we can celebrate the birth of Jesus for a season of 12 days, not just one!

A Minute to Learn: Intersectionality of Human Trafficking and the LGBTQ+ Community

January is National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month. LGBTQ+ people can be particularly vulnerable to human trafficking due in part to legal discrimination in employment and housing, as well as to families who are unsupportive, or worse, who kick their children out when they come out. Runaway and homeless youth are at a higher risk of being trafficked, but even youth living at home can be victims. Traffickers will often present themselves as the "hero" to a vulnerable person. They offer love, safety, shelter, and economic stability... at first. Traffickers are typically thought of as strangers, but can also be intimate partners, family members, and friends.
