

The desire of my heart would be to return to my retirement, but also to be sure there's meaningful worship at Richland First Pres. After Easter I'm going to cut back to one or two Sundays a month, and the Worship Ministry Elders and the Session will find leaders for the other weeks.

Recovery from a devastating stroke, like Pastor Mark had, is a true marathon. We all will run alongside, filled with hope.

We shouldn't be surprised that God, who conquered Jesus' death, can do amazing things in all our lives. Because

The Day of Silence (April 27, 2023) is a student-led event that raises awareness of anti-LGBTQ+ bullying, harassment, and discrimination in schools. J.S. Bach and Saturday Night Live

Johann Sebastian Bach already had the job of director of music for four (4!) Lutheran churches in Leipzig, Germany, and was also head of the associated choir school there where he taught singing and Latin. This, in addition to caring for his 20 offspring, kept his nose to the grindstone.

The city council decided to settle for Bach only after the famous Georg Telemann and one other candidate had said no thank you. Bach wasn't quite the bottom of the barrel—there were a few other applicants—but as far as the city fathers were concerned, Johann Sebastian Bach was definitely a B-minus candidate. One wise councilor even went on record saying that since the best could not be retained, they would just have to make do with the mediocre Bach.

This story is no secret to music students. Yet when you consider that today J.S. Bach is universally regarded as the supreme arbiter of Western musical thought, the tale still stops you in your tracks. Huh?

I encountered this tidbit of musical history again just the other day in a recent book titled How Can We Keep From Singing by Joan Oliver Goldsmith. Goldsmith is a high-end amateur singer who spices her writing with arresting insights.

For example, in one section she sums up a season of Bach's life as follows: "During his first two seasons in Leipzig (1723-24 and 1724-25) he composed a new cantata for every Sunday and every feast day—about sixty cantatas per year. [A cantata, by the way, is a composition for voices and instruments that is made up of choruses and solos. They are typically about 20 minutes long, but can be longer. I can think of no modern equivalent to such industry. The simple, physical act of writing out so much music is daunting—much less composing and rehearsing it for performance. It's as if the TV show Saturday Night Live were to run 52 weeks a year, with every show the responsibility of one writer rather than a collection of staff writers and freelancers. Oh, and as if that one writer were also supposed to supervise the production of the scripts in four different venues every week."

But who brings this and a host of other music to life? Goldsmith reports that according to the National Endowment for the Arts, more than 20 million Americans sing in choral groups. Such groups are primarily community choruses and church choirs, but they also include singers that regularly perform with major orchestras.

Collectively, these dedicated singers bring to the ears and hearts of the public many of the superb compositions of noted composers, both ancient and modern.

When I weary of war, death, and devastating natural disasters, I sometimes recall the song in the human heart, and in so doing find a great and solid hope.

My life flows on in endless song Above earth's lamentation

I hear the real though far off song That hails a new creation.

Through all the tumult and the strife I hear the music ringing.

It sounds an echo in my soul. How can I keep from singing!


