

And I should and we should remember Erin in our prayers for the diligent care for Mark, and our prayers for Mark as he exercises to recovery.

Lent gave us 40 Days, not counting Sundays, through which to prepare for the Easter Celebration. Easter came and then we are given 50 Days, counting Sundays, through which to Celebrate. Easter is not a one day event; our church fathers gave to us a season long in which to mark, remember, reflect on and celebrate the Resurrection. It is a Gift given, though not necessarily a Gift opened.

In one way of thinking, the Resurrection was the confirmation of the Announcement and Promise given to Mary of Nazareth that her Son Jesus was and would be Immanuel, God with us. The Resurrection and Transfiguration of Jesus marks a specifically physical event which restored Jesus to His Chosen Apostles and Disciples and all who would call Him Lord, meaning including all of us. The 50 Days following Easter are the opportunity to contemplate how it is that we can and do include the Living Jesus in all our thinking, in all our daily lives. When you see beauty, do you think of Jesus, or think Jesus might be sharing that beauty with you? When decisions need to be made, do you think of Jesus as one of the guides considering the different options? When confronted with something wrong, is it Jesus Who helps you understand it is wrong and why it is wrong and what to do about it....now/then? When at home with family, when feasting at the table, is Jesus at table with you-all?

A prayer before meals I learned as a child is — Come Lord Jesus, be out guest. Let these gifts to us be blest.



The First Presbyterian Church of Richland became an Earth Care Congregation of the Presbyterian Church USA in 2018. At that time, we chose to pledge to be good stewards of the God given blessings that are all around us. Below, find the Earth Care Pledge and some of the actions taken to preserve our church and the environment around it.

The Earth Care Pledge of peace and justice is God's plan for all creation. The earth and all creation are God's. God calls us to be careful, humble stewards of this earth, and to protect and restore it for its own sake, and for the future use and enjoyment of the human family. As God offers all people the special gift of peace through Jesus Christ, we are called to deal justly with one another and the earth.

- 1. Our worship and discipleship will celebrate God's grace and glory in creation and declare that God calls us to cherish, protect and be good stewards of this earth. Actions/Activities:
 - Maintain an Earth Care Congregation committee to spearhead local and community events.
 - Focus several sermons each year on Earth Care and Environmental Stewardship.
 - Conduct worship services focused on Earth Care and preserving the environment.
 - Conduct outdoor services in the Spring and Summer.
 - Display Earth Care Banner/Symbol during services, on new church signage, and throughout the church facility.
- 2. In education, we will seek learning and teaching opportunities to know and understand the threats to God's creation and the damage already inflicted. We will encourage and support each other in finding ways of keeping and healing the creation in response to God's call to earth keeping, justice and community. Actions/Activities:
 - Provide adult education opportunities during Earth Day observances.
 - Infuse Earth Care into youth education and Sunday school classes.
 - Plant and maintain flower gardens around the church and adjacent properties.
 - Plant and maintain pollinator/butterfly gardens (2023).
 - Create an Earth Care mural on Deacon Brown property (2023).
 - Plant new trees, shrubs, and flowers to beautify the church grounds.
 - Promote Earth Care on church Facebook, Website, and social media.

3. Our facilities will be managed, maintained and upgraded in a manner that respects and cherishes all creation, human and non-human, while meeting equitably the needs of all people. In our buildings and on our grounds, we will use energy efficiently, conserve resources, and share what we




- Replace furnaces and air conditioners with high efficiency models when possible.
- Weatherproof doors and windows.
- Replace conventional lighting with highly efficient LED lighting.
- Maintain an outside Memorial Garden and a place for prayer and contemplation.
- Purchase, maintain adjacent property for community use.
- Remove trash and diseased trees and plant new trees, shrubs, and flowers.
- Actively recycle plastics, glass, cardboard, & yard waste.
- 4. Our outreach will encourage public policy and community involvement that protects and restores the vulnerable and degraded earth as well as oppressed and neglected people. We will be mindful that our personal and collective actions can positively or negatively affect our neighborhood, region, nation and world. We will seek to achieve environmental justice through coalitions and ecumenical partnerships. Actions/Activities:
 - Conduct highway cleanup campaigns.
 - Work with Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts to clean and preserve outside areas, maintain flower gardens, and remove diseased trees.
 - Partner with the Gull Prairie Preserve to reestablish a natural 160-acre grassland prairie, oak tree savannahs, natural berry patches, and hiking trails next to the church. Use church parking lot as hiking trailhead.
 - Maintain the Northern Kalamazoo Country Food Pantry in partnership with Loaves and Fishes to distribute food donations to food insecure families.

God owns everything, and we are called upon to manage it for Him. The responsible management of these God-given resources is called stewardship. We are called to be God's stewards, just as we call on God to love and protect us.

A Minute to Learn: Pronouns

We are all familiar with traditional/binary personal pronouns (he/she) but non-binary and gender expansive people may choose to use different personal pronouns. They/them pronouns are most common; you can see how "them" and "their" were used above, in the recognition of our new logo. Neopronouns (xe/xem, e/em, and others) are less common, but some people prefer them because they do not elicit preconceptions about "grammar." (It should be noted, however, that singular "they" has been in use for centuries, and is approved for use by all major style guides.) It's important to respect a person's pronouns, and if you're not sure what to use, it's OK to ask! And if you happen to make a mistake (we all do!), acknowledge it, correct yourself, and move on. Practice makes progress.

Grace and peace, Pat Weatherwax

Nathan Martens has worked in health care since 1990. He's an inquirer under the care of the Presbytery of Lake Michigan. His second year at Western Theological Seminary in Holland is almost complete.

Nathan and his wife, Wendy, were married at Richland First Presbyterian on 1/2/21. He has two college aged kids. Betsy will graduate from Valparaiso on May 14. Nick is a junior at the University of Michigan.

Their canine kids are Pembroke Welsh Corgis. Addie is 11 and Tillie is nine months. They also have a cat named Gus.

Rev. Bob Bond graduated from Chicago Theological Seminary in 2005 and was ordained the same year in the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches. He was trained in intentional interim ministry and has served most of his calling as an intentional interim. He's served eight different congregations. Bob lives in Kalamazoo with his Dog D. D is short for D.Min or Doctor of Ministry, joking that it was the only way he was going to get a D.Min.

Rev. Kathleen Robertson King graduated from Louisville Seminary in 1999, and was ordained in 2000. Kathleen is a campus minister at United Campus Ministry in Kalamazoo, which provides students with service/learning and social justice opportunities rooted in racial equity work in Kalamazoo and beyond. She is married to Kevin, a librarian, and mother to two delightful young adult daughters, Abigail and Rachael. Kathleen adores art in all its forms, including paintings, movies, novels, poetry, an eclectic selection of music, time in the kitchen, and is always up for a walk in the great outdoors, no matter the weather. For Kathleen, life without a dog is incomplete.

Rev. Pat Weatherwax is returning to Richland's pulpit, 1-2 times a month, going forward. Something you haven't heard about is that Pat works, on call a couple of days each week, as a medical examiner investigator, in Calhoun Co. This is a department of WMed, the medical school in Kalamazoo. Thirteen counties are served out of the department of pathology at WMed. Investigators respond to deaths that happen outside of hospice care or not under direct inpatient hospital care. It feels to Pat that this work is a mix of chaplaincy and nursing, and usually only takes her away from her husband at home for a few hours each week. Pat likes dogs, but currently only has a scaredy-cat named Bella Boo.

<u>Always Is</u>, a novel by Laurie
Frankel. Look for this title on the

This family of boys readily accept all their children's quirks and comical antics, even when their youngest child, Claude, at a very young age has a preference for girl toys

and clothing over the usual boy stuff. The family comes to realize that Poppy (Claude) is not going through a phase, and they and their community accept her for who she really is, a transgender child. After a traumatic experience, the family moves across country, and for the good of their family, they keep Poppy's previous gender identity (male) a secret. This completely changes the family dynamics, which causes turmoil, conflict, and emotional issues they never faced when they could be open and honest about their transgender child.

The author is a parent of a transgender daughter, but this story is purely fiction, and not her family's story. Though her own family has not lived this story plot, it is her voice of being a parent of a gender dysphoric child that gives this novel its strength. Currently on Amazon there are over 35,700 reviews with an overall rating of 4.5 out of 5 stars.


- Ezekiel 19:10-11
