Earth Care Congregation At Work Inside

Our Church remains committed to being an Earth Care congregation. One of the areas of emphasis is facility management. In the past we have invested in high efficiency furnace and air conditioners when replacements are needed and replacing Gull Prairie Room

lights with efficient LED bulbs. Such efforts are environmentally responsible and can save the church much needed operating

funds.

Building and Grounds Elder Steve
Sutherland contacted Consumers
Energy to conduct a free audit of
the church with a goal to conserve
energy. As a result of this audit,
multiple energy saving recommendations were made, including changing over to low energy consumption,
no-cost LED bulbs where feasible, and
replaced several faucet aerators with the
latest low-flow design to conserve water,


which saves money and energy. Consumers also made a commitment to come back on June 9th to replace all the chandelier lights in the Sanctuary with LED lights. This is great news as many lights are burnt out and replacement costs are high.

Since the Gull Prairie Room air conditioning unit has failed after 23 years of service, both it and the associated furnace will be replaced with new high-efficiency units in the near future, prior to the Rummage Sale dates.

Thank you to members of the Earth Care Committee and several volunteers for taking the lead on these improvements

Happy Father's Day to all those at FPC!


