#### On Community

It's not about introversion or extroversion, (well, not this time anyway). Still, my thoughts this month take me to the question of community. And yes, while our personality styles often determine how much we need it, we. nonetheless, ALL need community. Even monastic monks who don't speak to one another from sunrise to sunset still function in community,

Last week, an article was sent to Erin and me about the "Kirk" in Scotland. The traditional church, going back to the 14th century, is now struggling.

Meanwhile, an evangelical movement in Scotland, with its roots in the US, is renting out halls and filling them with young people, students, and families looking for something new.

There are numerous reasons why the Kirk is changing in Scotland, many are theological, but for the purposes of this letter, I will highlight the need for community. Those filling the halls are excited to be part of something new and different but they are also driven by the crowd, the sense that they belong to something with so many others.

About a month ago, I asked on our church Facebook page to complete the following statement, "For me, God is most manifested ." (You can still go there and add your answer). The choices in the poll were *"inwardly, outwardly, equally both, other, or none of* the above." I will share that I said "inwardly". In fact, the largest number of you also said inwardly. The next largest group was "equally both" and only a small number said "outwardly" or "other". Maybe this isn't a So Beloved, as the scripture says, let us "dwell together surprise, that many of us, as Presbyterians, find God most manifested within, or at least equally within and without.

But before we look for that isolated place on a mountain top, scientists are discovering that human beings need encounters in community in order to be happy. And aren't happiness and spiritual wellbeing too intertwined to separate? So when I came across an NPR piece about happiness (you can find it, along with the piece on the Kirk, on the Adult Ed page on FB) and recognized the conclusion is that we ALL need a sense of community, I realized there is a thru line in both pieces, and that is community.

Far be it for me to try and change your answer in the poll anymore than I would try to change my own but this does give me reason to pause and consider how I might stretch myself to consider God manifest in the world and in the faces all around me. Studies cited in the NPR piece indicated that experiences—such as positive stranger encounters or mere acquaintances simply sharing a kind word or a humorous observation accumulated throughout our days can add up to a strong sense of connectedness and this, in turn, promotes happiness.

*I* would add that worshipping together or having a great encounter over coffee following worship promotes a sense of well-being through connectedness and this, in turn, brings us closer to God.

For those lucky enough to hear the Word proclaimed by the very wise Pat Weatherwax on Sunday, she reminded us of the words of Dietrich Bonhoeffer from Life Together: The Classic Exploration of Christian Community, "God has taught us to meet one another as God has met us in Christ."

#### How to Tell a Good Music Teacher

A new school year is upon us. For a number of you there may also be "private" lessons on a musical instrument of your choice, or on one recommended by a music teacher. What is presented here can be used anytime you choose. Many of you may actively pursue music, or may have a secret desire to do so. Many more of you are parents of students who are active music students already.

Are all of you in good hands?

Fortunately, I've had the pure blind luck of having had some first-rate music teachers. Though I claim no special authority in this matter, sharing my thoughts and experiences may shed some light on the subject for you.

First, you won't necessarily find a really fine music teacher by visiting your local music dealer, though I suppose it's possible. Nor will you necessarily find a reputable teacher through media ads since the good ones always have new students waiting in line for them. And just because the lady down the street teaches piano and has a convenient address is no assurance of quality instruction.

The best approach is to get the opinion of experts. Call your local university's music department and ask them for their recommendation. Or, say you hear a really fine pianist like our own Maureen Lovequist. Ask her for lessons, or if she can't take you on at present, ask if she may know who might.

Bear in mind that it's just too risky to trust the word on the street.

So, what's it like to sit down one-to-one in the private studio of a real master? Well, it's a little scary at first, but it's also totally magical. It's scary because if the teacher is worth her salt, you'll quickly realize that she knows more, and maybe has forgotten more about the piano, than you may ever know. It's magical because here you are with this great teacher that you have all to yourself for the next entire hour. Though learning may not be a piece of cake, she will make it a lot of fun. What other qualities might you expect?

#### Hallmarks of a Fine Music Teacher

**Kindness** This is a given. You will be treated with kindness and respect merely because of your mutual interest The teacher will love the fact that you crave her knowledge.

**Patience** The teacher's patience will approach the infinite simply because she's been in your shoes and she knows the terrific challenge in front of you.

**Discipline** Despite your teacher's kindness and patience, she will not be a pushover. She will float the banner and it will be high, plus she will expect you to follow it to the letter.

**Helpfulness** You will be shown exactly how to execute a technical maneuver. Nothing will be left to guesswork. Your teacher will carefully and skillfully instruct you on exact details and will demonstrate. She will explain the mysteries of practice and will have you repeat certain passages several times. [The great French organist Marcel Dupré practiced each measure of music 17 times before proceeding to the next measure. Naturally, that's part of why he played so flawlessly.]

**Criticism** A good teacher will be off-the-charts in this category. I don't mean she will rant and rave, no. But her attention to detail may amaze you, and she won't let you get away with anything. Every jot and tittle will have the full light of day cast upon it. [How pleasantly I recall my great teacher Huw Lewis when one day he dropped to his knees beside the organ bench in convulsive laughter. We had worked on two measures, two measures! for a good part of the one-hour lesson, and I simply couldn't please him. I finally caved in and told him I'd have it down to perfection by the following week, and I knew he'd be expecting results.

**Praise** When you come to your lesson well prepared and play or sing something really well, she will make you glow with the praise she will lavish upon you. Being praised by a master is a fantastic excursion into selfesteem.

This is merely an overview. I'd welcome your personal observations, questions or comments.

A Minute to Learn: Suicide Risk and LGBTQ+ Youth September is National Suicide Prevention Awareness Month. LGBTQ+ youth are more than 4 times more likely to attempt suicide than non-LGBTQ+ youth. According to a 2022 study by The Trevor Project, 45% of LGBTQ+ youth seriously considered suicide in the past year; this rate rose to more than half for transgender and non-binary youth. Bullying, social stigma, marginalization, discrimination, religious pressure, and a lack of family support are primary contributors to the increased risk. Non-white youth had a higher risk rate than white youth, with indigenous and Black transgender/non-binary youth having the highest risk profile. But there is some good news: having at least one accepting adult reduces the risk of suicide by 40%, and those LGBTQ+ youth who feel strong support from their families had a reduced risk of more than half. Did you know that Luke was an infant during Jesus' public ministry?


Did you know that Luke's mother is given credit for Luke's Christian faith and that it is sometimes said Luke is a Second-Generation Christian?
