Look for them when you arrive and during the service, consider something for which you would like to thank God. You don't have to put your name on it. Also, if you have a prayer concern that you want to offer. Fold the slip for privacy and know that I am the only one who reads these.

Meet Jonatan

Meet Jonatan (pronounced $H\bar{o}-n\check{u}-t\check{o}n$) De La Cruz and his sons, Angel (pronounced $\check{O}-\check{e}l$) and Joel (pronounced $\check{O}-\check{e}l$). Jonatan is Jeni Steele's "first" father from before her adoption. Jonatan was very young – only 14 when Jeni was born. He did his best to parent her, but that is far too young. He is now 38 years old and lives in Guatemala City, where he has lived his entire life. Angel turned 15 and Joel 12 this past summer, and they also live in Guatemala. The Steele family found Jonatan in 2010 and have developed a very strong relationship with him and his sons since that time. Although Jeni has the biological connection, the entire Steele family consider Jonatan and the boys their family.

Several years ago, Jill Steele set up a virtual interview between Jonatan and the owner of Seasonal Grille restaurant in Hastings – Justin. Since the pandemic, Justin has struggled to find and keep reliable cook staff at his restaurant. As a result of the interview, Justin judged Jonatan to be a seasoned, experienced chef and offered him a full-time permanent job at Seasonal Grille, offering to sponsor him for an employment VISA. This process is long and has been officially underway since early November of 2021. We expect to have the answer to the final step in the employment VISA process by early October this year – the Immigration petition. After that, the only remaining steps are submitting the VISA supporting







As many of us know, Guatemala can be a very difficult place to live, with low wages, high crime, and a government struggling with corruption issues. In spite of having only an early middle school education, Jonatan has become a successful chef through his hard work and dedication. He has been the executive chef at Verde Limon Restaurant in Guatemala, where he has worked for the last nearly 7 years. In total, he has almost 17 years' experience in the Guatemalan restaurant industry. However, in spite of his experience and responsibilities as the executive chef, the pay isn't enough to support himself and his children without living communally with his father, his brother, and his wife and children. Jonatan and the boys also long to have a relationship with Jeni that extends beyond one short visit every few years when the Steele family might travel to Guatemala. (Tourist VISAs are very difficult to obtain, and Jonatan would likely never qualify since he isn't a high school graduate and owns no real estate.)

Couple Jonatan's background with the employee shortage in the restaurant industry in the United States, and certainly here in Michigan, and you find the path for Jonatan and the boys to qualify to come to Michigan.

documents, and the VISA interview. Jonatan and the boys will live with the Steele family so that they can help the boys with transportation to school and athletic events, as well as to help them with homework while their dad is working, which will likely include a lot of evenings — and to provide them the love and sense of security they will need to adjust to this life altering move. The Steeles will also provide and/or arrange for Jonatan's transportation to work until he has been able to get a driver's license and save enough money for a car and insurance. Jonatan and the boys' mother have been apart for many years, but she agreed to consent to the boys' planned immigration to the United States, because as she states, "it is their only hope for a future."

If you watch the church service on Facebook, you may have noticed Jonatan virtually attends the Sunday church service while he is working in Guatemala. He feels the love and support of his "church family," as he likes to say. Jonatan and the boys are eager to see this process through and finally realize their dream of coming to Michigan to reunite with Jeni and the entire Steele family, and to live out the American dream of opportunities.


<u>Church Can Save the World</u> by Allen Hilton. Amazon describes what the book is about:

By entering the culture wars, churchgoers in the United States have ushered the Left and the Right to even greater extremes. Battles over moral issues like abortion rights and homosexuality have now widened to include taxation and size of government, so that specific church affiliation has become an accurate predictor of political party affiliation. The extremists in American politics rely on Christians to be the engine that pushes the culture farther right or left.

Allen Hilton believes that religion isn't inherently divisive, and he suggests a new role for Christianity. Jesus prayed that his disciples might all be one, and this book imagines a proper answer to that prayer in the context of American polarization.

Rather than asking people to leave their political and theological beliefs at the church door, Hilton promotes a Christianity that brings people together with their differences. Through God's transforming work, he writes, we can create a house united that will help our nation come back together.

A Minute to Learn: October is LGBTQ+ History Month, an annual celebration of the history and achievements of the LGBTQ+ community, established in 1994. National Coming Out Day, Spirit Day, Ally/Solidarity Week, and several other days of recognition and awareness are celebrated in October. Notably, the first March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights was held on October 14, 1979. There was debate over whether to hold the march in 1979 or 1980. The year 1979 was chosen as it was the 10 year anniversary of the Stonewall Riots. As many as 125,000 people participated, making it the largest such event in Washington DC at the time. Subsequent marches took place in 1987, 1993, 2000 and 2009. There were 5 primary goals of the march: pass a comprehensive gay rights bill in Congress; ban discrimination against LGBTQ+ people in the federal government, military and federal contracts; repeal all anti-gay/lesbian laws; end discrimination in parental custody cases where one parent is LGBTQ+; and protect gay and lesbian youth from discrimination, harassment and opposition at home, in school, at work, and in social settings. Nearly half a century later, LGBTQ+ people still struggle with discrimination and harassment. Allyship/Solidarity is critical to ensure that we do not move backwards in our recognition of human rights for all people, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity.

Where Did Sacred Music Come From?

When you take a deep breath this coming Sunday to get ready for the church's triumphant hymn of praise, know that you are participating in a tradition that goes back not hundreds of years, but multiple millennia.

The first biblical record about music is in Genesis 4:21, referring to Jubal as the ancestor of all those who sing or play sacred music. This was roughly 4,000 years ago. Think of it, four thousand years.

From the time of Abraham, the Israelites were a musical people, as the Arabs are to this day, living in the same country, exhibiting their musical nature in pouring forth an unending voice of song. The Egyptians were practical musicians, and introduced music upon all festive occasions. During the Israelite bondage, the Hebrews became acquainted with the musical instruments of the Egyptians, which they carried with them across the desert into Canaan and their use has been recorded in every succeeding age.

Music was also used socially from an early date (Gen. 31:27), as an accompaniment to song and dance. David himself was an accomplished musician, and gave much attention to musical art. He even introduced it into the temple worship service. Concerning the transport of the Ark of the Covenant into Jerusalem, First Chronicles has this to say about the sacred music of the ancients:

David also commanded the chiefs of the Levites to appoint their kindred as the singers to play on musical instruments, on harps, and lyres, and cymbals, to raise loud sounds of joy. So the Levites appointed Heman, son of Joel; and of his kindred Asahp, son of Berechiah; and of the sons of Merari, their kindred, Ethan, son of Kushaiah, and with them their kindred of the second order, Zechariah, Jaazziel, Shermiramoth, Jehiel, Unni, Eliab, Beamoth, Maaseia, Mattithiah, Eliphelehu, and Mikneiah, and the gatekeepers Obededom and Jeiel. The singers Heman, Asaph, and Ethan were to sound bronze cymbals; Zechariah, Aziel, Shemiramoth, Jehiel, Unni, Eliab, Maaseiah, and Benaiah were to play harps according to Alamoth; but Mattithiah, Eliphelehu, Mikneiah, Obededom, Jeiel, and Azaziah were to lead with lyres according to the Sheminith. Chenaniah, leader of the Levites in music, was to direct the music, for he understood it. Berechiah and Elkanah were to be gatekeepers for the Ark. Shebaniah, Joshaphat, Nethanel, Amasai, Zechariah, Benaiah and Eliezer, the priests, were to blow the trumpets before the Ark of God.

I Chronicles 15: I 6~24a

Preserved for posterity the above list chronicles some of the first real church musicians. It is probable also that choirs were a part of the temple service. The prophets themselves were great cultivators of music, and music was an important branch of instruction in the schools of the prophets.

Until some wizard invents time travel, these ancient services are lost to us, at least what they sounded like. But do not lament! The modern day great cathedral service may at least epitomize a similar spirit.

If you have access to the internet, there is hardly an end to the number and variety of churches and great cathedrals whose doors are open to you. One of my favorites is Grace Cathedral, in San Francisco. Every Sunday at 2 p.m. EDT you have a passport to heavenly mysteries. Go to www.gracecathedral.org If you want to hear the Prelude played on one of the great pipe organs of this country, tune in early. Click Services, then click Choral Eucharist-- the 11 a.m. edition.

If you've never attended a major cathedral service, the experience awaits you- live on Sundays at two o'clock. Or any other time during the week when you can listen to a professional recording of this great service and other fine offerings, including daily devotions.

KidsFirst, Answering the Tough Questions

Is it okay to doubt God?
Why does God let bad stuff happen?
How do I forgive when I don't want to?
Why do we even go to church?
Am I really expected to love EVERYONE?

Have you ever wondered what the Bible says about these questions? Have you ever had a question that you were uncomfortable asking because you were afraid the other person might not like it or they may judge you for asking? Our youth are often full of questions - about religion, the Bible, our beliefs/ values, and God - but may be afraid to ask because it feels taboo or they feel they may be shamed for questioning the Christian faith. As adults, it is easy to get defensive when questions arise that feel uncomfortable. They aren't easy questions to answer, they are sticky and complicated. There is no quick scripture to reference or answer that can easily be found. These questions can feel like an attack... but they are far from it! It is important that as a church, we embrace the tough questions and encourage our youth to ask them.. because if they don't ask them, we will never have the opportunity to dig deep with them and learn with them!

Our new upper elementary classroom is tackling one of these questions (and many more) each week! Our new curriculum, Be BOLD, focuses on diving into a common question that youth often have but may feel uncomfortable vocalizing. We get to explore the Bible through a new lens - one that is

based in solving everyday struggles and challenges - to see how others have encountered similar situations and what the Bible says about them. And then, we get to talk as a group about how that applies to our lives today.


SO...

Maybe forgiveness isn't all about forgiving the other person for what they did... maybe it is about letting go of our own anger and giving it to God. We can learn that forgiveness does not mean that what the other person did is okay, but it means that we aren't going to let that weight sit on our shoulders anymore.

When God says "love others" what does that mean? We get to dig deep into whether love is just a feeling or also an action. When you hear "love your enemy" does that mean actually feeling love towards them or to treat them with kindness and compassion?

The more we address these tough questions head on, the less sticky they feel! Actually, we may find that the stickiest part of it all is the threads God has used to weave a beautiful web for us to land in ... no matter what life throws our way! Take a few minutes this month to think about what behaviors and actions God wants us to "stick" to and add it to the web on the next page. Find words in magazines and/or newspapers and stick them to the web! If a KidsFirst member completes the activity and shows it to Brooke, they can take a trip to the treasure box!
