September 2014 Missionary Report from Deng Thon Alier (Samuel)

Logistics Coordination: I have been working since July 1st with Partners for Compassionate Care (PCC) and Memorial Christian Hospital (MCH.) As I told you before, I am working as Logistics for the organization and I also fill in when the Site administrator is away. The Site Administrator was off the site for one week in August and I managed the facility when he was away. I was able to do my logistics duties and the roles of Site Administrator.

Progress on the Hospital: PCC is still planning to move MCH back to Werkok from Bor Town. Our medical personnel are treating clinical cases in Bor Town and the internally displaced people's (IDP) camp nearby at Awerial. We have no surgeries in Bor and MCH. We have been informed to clean up both the MCH compound and hospital before the staff moves back to Werkok. I have been traveling to Werkok from Bor to check on the progress of the work in Werkok. The people we contracted with are expected to finish the residential and hospital sites. After that, work will begin inside the hospital. The hospital is infested with bats and other insects and we cannot use the hospital until it is clean.

IDPs Camp: I travel to IDPs camp sometimes for a break. We also have our sister clinic in a IDPs camp near Bor Town and I went there last weekend to see what their logistic needs are. The IDPs clinic is helping a big population and that has been a blessing to our hospital.

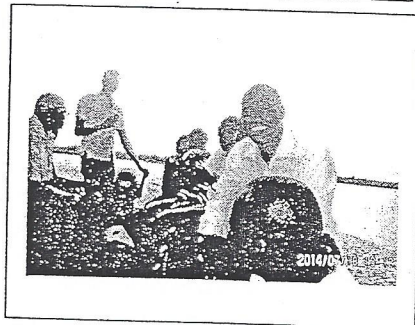
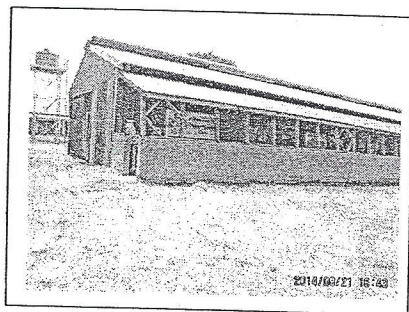

It has been long time and my visit to US will be a thanksgiving gift for you. I have been away for so long, serving my people, and you have been with me in your prayers and financial support. I'm looking forward to sharing my experiences with you and telling you what God has done for me during the time I have spent in Africa. I am preparing my PowerPoint presentation to share with you when I am over there. My brother Abraham is also planning to visit me in Michigan and this will be another opportunity for me to see my brother. We saw each other one time when he came to Africa. It will be fantastic for the two of us to be together again in Michigan.

On the other hand, it will be heartbreaking knowing that I will not see Carolyn Curtis and the rest of the members who passed in my absent will be disturbing. And so, generations come and generations go.

I am looking forward to your big hugs and great smiles.

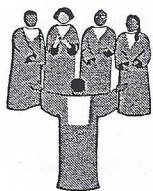


This and that....

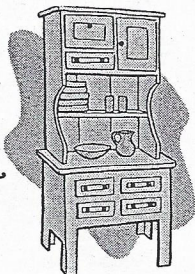

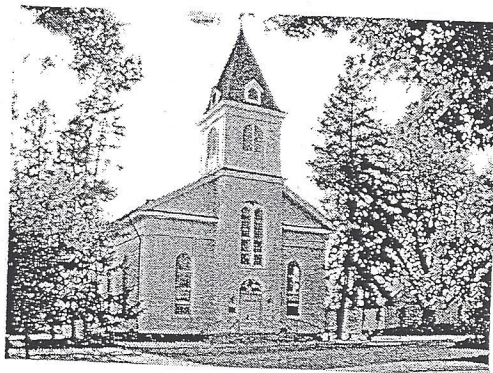

Post run and walk snacks—1:15-3:00

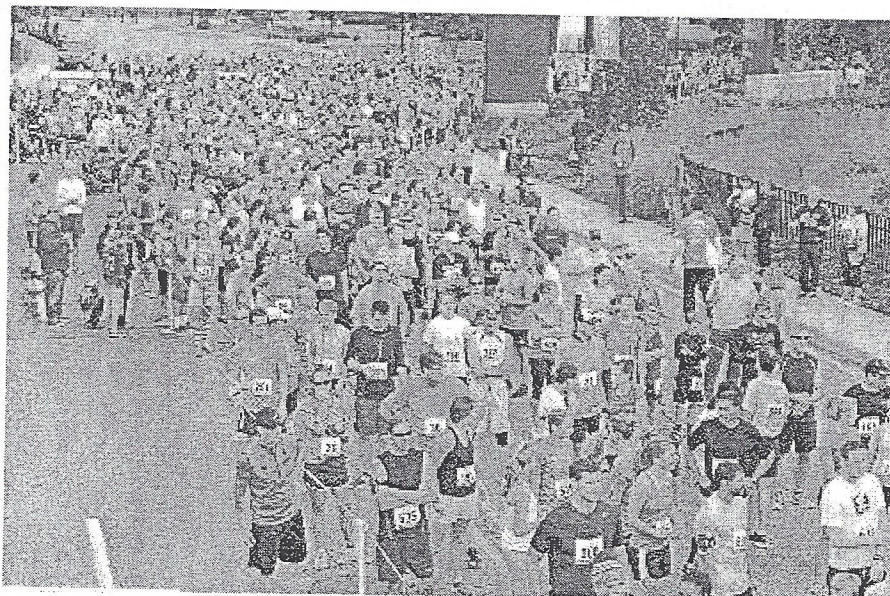

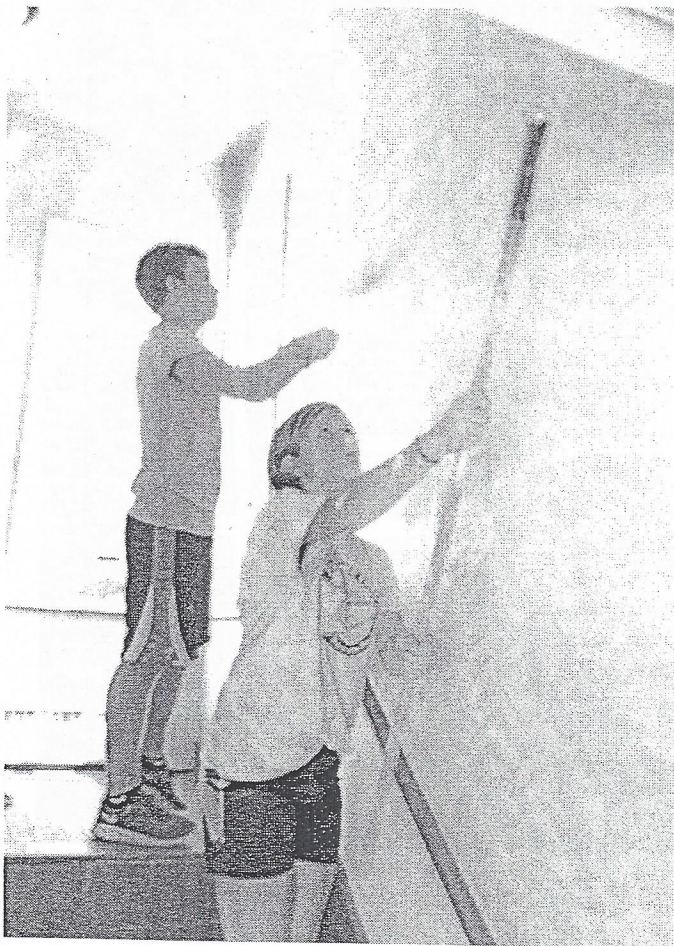


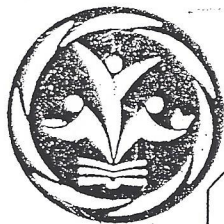


THANK YOU!

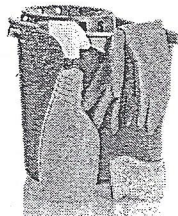

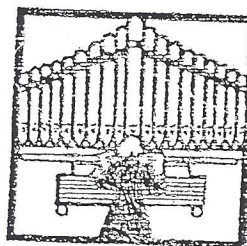

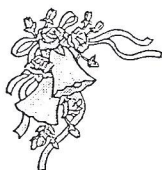
